COLLOQUIAL ARABIC TRACK

This two-part program includes a preliminary course in written Arabic (Part I) followed by a Colloquial Arabic course offered on three levels (Part II). Note that students with sufficient knowledge of Literary Arabic may apply for exemption from Part I.

Summer Courses (in English)

June 29–July 27, 2010

Note: Participants who enroll in more than one of the Summer Courses listed below receive a 10% tuition discount.

► **Conflict Resolution from Theory to Practice: Israel as a Case Study**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1250 • Housing: \$610

The Arab-Israeli conflict is examined in the context of current practices and theories relating to conflict resolution.

► **The Arab-Israeli Conflict: Political and Religious History**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1250 • Housing: \$610

The course traces the history of the Arab-Israeli conflict from the rise of Zionism, through the various Arab-Israel wars, and up to the recent peace negotiations.

► **The Middle East and the World: A Middle Eastern Perspective on International Relations**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1250 • Housing: \$610

The course aims to determine the common denominators and rules behind nationalism and ethnicity, domestic politics and foreign policy in the Middle East and North Africa.

► **The Emergence of the Modern Middle East**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1350 • Housing: \$610

The course surveys the social and political history of the Middle East from 1800 to the present.

► **Environmental Challenges in the Middle East**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1350 • Housing: \$610

The course presents the complexity of serious environmental problems and the challenges posed by various solutions to them, focusing on Israel and the Middle East.

► **The Emergence of the Modern State of Israel**

Academic Hours: 60 • Credits: 4 • Tuition: \$1350 • Housing: \$610

The course traces the internal development of the Jewish community – its political, cultural and social evolution, as well as the external relations with the Ottoman and later British Empire and most particularly with the Arabs both inside and outside of Palestine/Israel.

► **Public International Law: The Case of Jerusalem**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1250 • Housing: \$610

Concepts in the international legal system are examined, making reference to the status of Jerusalem where relevant, and the status of the city after the Six-Day War is analyzed.

► **Jerusalem through the Ages: Historical Geography and Archaeology**

Academic Hours: 60 • Credits: 4 • Tuition: \$1450 • Housing: \$610

The historical-cultural geography of Jerusalem from Biblical times, through the Middle Ages to the present is described and interpreted, with reference to the nature of the Middle Eastern city. The course includes 10 field trips throughout Jerusalem.

► **Sixty Years of Israeli Film: Society and Culture as Reflected in Israeli Cinema**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1250 • Housing: \$610

Popular themes in Israeli cinema are introduced, with an emphasis on their sociological and political aspects. Documentaries and feature films are screened.

► **Jewish Mysticism: Toward a Genealogy of the Esoteric**

Academic Hours: 45 • Credits: 3 • Tuition: \$1250 • Housing: \$610

The course offers a broad historical and conceptual introduction to Jewish mysticism, from the First Temple period to the present day, through the study of primary texts and secondary literature.

August 2–25, 2010

► **Introduction to the Study of Islam and the Middle East**

Academic Hours: 60 • Credits: 4 • Tuition: \$1350 • Housing: \$570

The course discusses the principles of faith, rituals, legal methods of religious law, and sects and streams in Islam. It includes a general historical review of the Arabs and Muslims in the Middle East and a brief discussion of political and social developments that accompanied the growth of Muslim society and religion.

Trauma and Resilience: Theory and Practice from the Israeli Experience

This course presents the latest developments in the field of trauma in Israel as well as internationally, exploring theories and research on trauma, coping, resilience, and post-traumatic growth in a variety of cultural and situational contexts.

► **Clinical Training in Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Post-Traumatic Disorders**
